



Visiting Korean History

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SHORT COURSE DESCRIPTION

[The objective of this course is to foster a foundational understanding of Korean history. Given the vastness of Korea's 5000-year history, fully comprehending it in 3 weeks is a challenge. Therefore, our focus will be on key issues that continue to influence Korean culture and the way Koreans perceive their society and the world.]

During the first half of the term, we will delve into significant events and issues of the Joseon Dynasty. Topics will include the rise of the Joseon Dynasty, the creation of the Korean script Hangeul, the spread of Confucian culture, the impact of two wars, and the flourishing of Joseon culture and technology, and the eventual fall of the Dynasty. In the latter half of the term, we will shift our attention to modern times, discussing topics like Japanese colonization, liberation, division, the process of democratization, and the developments in economics and culture.

Our exploration of these issues will occur in two ways. Firstly, through pre-recorded/live lectures, we will discuss the nature, historical implications, and significance of each topic. We'll also examine the extent to which each issue has shaped Korean society. This approach will help students grasp the political, social, economic, and cultural development of Korea, as well as how these experiences have influenced Koreans' perspectives on society, the world, and their value system.

The second approach involves the students' indirect experience of Korean heritage and culture. Students will be encouraged to watch films, TV programmes, documentaries, or conduct research on specific topics. These experiences will be shared in our real-time streaming classes, fostering active student involvement through presentations, discussions, and assignments. By integrating these experiences with the lectures, students will gain a deeper understanding of the historical artifacts and how Koreans' historical experiences find expression in Korean cultural products. Furthermore, this will allow them to recognize the connections between these expressions and the value system and worldview of Koreans.]

READING MATERIALS

[Chapters from diverse coursebooks on Korean history will be posted on i-Campus well in advance of each class.]

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

[Attendance: 20%, Mid-term Assignment: 30%, Final Exam: 40%, and Participation: 10%.]

Students are required to watch the pre-recorded lectures before the specified deadline. Also, students should attend the real-time streaming classes on time.
